- **3.1** An application has been made under section 34 Licensing Act 2003 ("the 2003 Act") as applied by Schedule 8 paragraph 7 for the variation of the premises licence in relation to the above property.
- 3.2 This hearing is held in accordance with the 2003 Act and the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.
- **3.3** The procedure to be followed has been circulated to all parties and will be repeated at the beginning of the hearing.
- 3.4 The hearing is solely concerned with those aspects of the application which have been the subject of relevant representations as defined in the 2003 Act.

# 4. RELEVENT REPRESENTATIONS

# 4.1 RESPONSIBLE AUTHORITIES

 The following responsible authorities have made relevant representations Cheshire Constabulary Environmental Health

The relevant representations relate to

Cheshire Constabulary
Require conditions relating to Proof of Age / Challenge 21
Conditions

- The licence holder shall ensure that anyone who appears to be under 21 years of age who is consuming alcohol or attempting to purchase alcohol will be asked to prove their age. Accepted methods of proof of age are: passports, photo driving licences and PASS accredited proof of age cards e.g. Validate, Connexions, Citizen Card, Prove It Card. If any such person fails to satisfy the licence holder by means of such proof of age that they are 18 years old or older that person shall be ejected from the premises forthwith.
- A notice or notices shall be displayed in and at the entrance to the premises where they can be clearly seen and read and shall indicate that it is unlawful for persons under 18 to purchase alcohol or for any person to purchase alcohol on behalf of a person under 18 years of age.

### **Environmental Health**

Environmental Health would not object in principle to the application subject to the following conditions

- All doors and windows must be kept closed when any amplified music or voices are being played within the premises.
- Any live music played at the premises shall be played through a noise limiting device. The activation level of this device must be set and sealed by an officer of the Local authority's Environmental Health Division.
- No external speakers shall be used outside the building: this will include any beer gardens or outside drinking area or car park.
- The use of any outside area will cease at 23.20.
- All activities specified within section E shall be permitted between the hours of 11.00 & 23.00 hrs Sunday – Thursday and 11.00 & 00.00 Friday and Saturday.
- The premises shall be open to the public between the hours of 11.00 & 00.00 Sunday to Thursday and 11.00 & 01.00 Friday and Saturday.
- An hours extension to all licensed activities shall be permitted for the Saints days as specified the Thursday of the Easter Bank Holiday Christmas Eve and Boxing Day

### 4.2 INTERESTED PARTIES

 The following interested parties have made relevant representations
 27 letters of objection were received from residents in the vicinity of the premises (see appendix 1)

The relevant representations relate to

- If increased hours are allowed there will be increased noise and nuisance
- Unruly and drunken hooligans in Regent Road shouting and cursing at the tops of their voices after drinking themselves into a stupid state
- Cars parked in the road are constantly being damaged wing mirrors being broken people climbing on top of cars.
- Patrons of premises urinating and vomiting in paths and gardens of homes in the area
- Patrons of premises banging on house windows scaring people half to death
- Excessive loud music from live bands
- Fireworks displays at odd times
- o Glasses left on wall around pub and Victoria Park
- Large groups at the front of the pub at all hours
- o Emptying of bottle skips late at night
- Damage to property garden walls fences drain pipes etc
- Extending the hours will not improve the situation
