1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

To provide relevant information for the holding of a hearing to assess relevant representations made in response to an application by James Edward King for a premises licence in respect of land at Daresbury.

2. RECOMMENDATION

That the Committee considers the relevant representations and determine the application in accordance with the options available to it (as listed in section 8 to this Agenda)

3. SUPPORTING INFORMATION

- 3.1** The application has been made under section 17 Licensing Act 2003 ("the 2003 Act").
- 3.2** This hearing is held in accordance with the 2003 Act and the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.
- 3.3** The procedure to be followed has been circulated to all parties and will be repeated at the beginning of the hearing.
- 3.4** The hearing is solely concerned with those aspects of the application, which have been the subject of relevant representations as defined in the 2003 Act.

4 THE APPLICATION

- 4.1** Mr King has made the application in respect of farmland at the Daresbury Estate and Holly Hedge Farm. The application area is approximately 195,000 square metres. The application is in respect of a proposed music festival consisting of stages and tents. Separate tents selling alcohol, soft drinks, food and merchandise are also intended to be located within the site.
- 4.2** The number of people expected to attend the proposed music festival is stated to not exceed 44,999.

- 4.3 The application is for a music festival taking place over two days: Saturday 26th and Sunday 27th August 2006. The application is for the premises to be open to the public between 1300 on 26th August and 0700 on 27th August.
- 4.4 The application includes the supply of alcohol on the premises between the hours of 1300 on 26th August and 0400 on 27th August.
- 4.5 The application includes late night refreshment on the premises between the hours of 2300 on 26th August and 0500 on 27th August.
- 4.6 Given that the application is for a music festival the most significant elements of the application are in respect of live music, recorded music, performance of dance, and the provision of facilities for dancing. The application in respect of all of these activities is for them to take place between the hours of 1300 on 26th August and 0600 on 27th August.
- 4.7 However, the application states that use of the main stage would cease at 2300 on 26th August.

5 ROLE OF WARRINGTON BOROUGH COUNCIL AND LOCAL PARISH COUNCILS

- 5.1 The application is unusual in that part of the application site is within the Borough of Warrington. In these cases the 2003 Act directs that the licensing authority within whose area the majority of the site is situated is the relevant licensing authority for the purposes of receiving and determining the application.
- 5.2 Responsible authorities situated within both licensing authorities have jurisdiction to make relevant representations.
- 5.3 Parish Councils have no right to make relevant representations under the 2003 Act but can be appointed by interested parties who have made relevant representations to represent them at hearings.

6 RELEVANT REPRESENTATIONS

6.1 RESPONSIBLE AUTHORITIES

CHESHIRE CONSTABULARY

The Police do not object to the grant of a premises licence but have requested a number of conditions to be attached to the premises licence. Details are set out in **Appendix 1**.

HALTON BOROUGH COUNCIL

Halton Borough Council in its various capacities as responsible authority do not object to the application for a premises licence. However, the Licensing Authority are recommended to attach a number of conditions relating to noise and health and safety matters. Details are set out in **Appendix 2**.

WARRINGTON BOROUGH COUNCIL

Warrington Borough Council is entitled to make representations as a 'responsible authority' as defined in section 13(4) Licensing Act 2003. Warrington Borough Council could write in one or more of the following capacities:

- Health & Safety Enforcing Authority – section 12(4)(c)
- Local Planning Authority – section 12(4)(d)
- Environmental Health Authority – section 12(4)(e)
- Licensing Authority in whose area part of the premises is situated – section 12(4)(g).

Warrington Borough Council object to the grant of a premises licence. Details are set out in **Appendix 3**. The sole ground of objection is "prevention of public nuisance". The basis of the objection is that noise would be audible after 23.00 at specified premises and that this would contravene the 1995 Code of Practice on Environmental Noise Control at Concerts. Although not expressly stated in the representation this refers to the following paragraph of the Code:

"3.2 For events continuing or held between the hours 23.00 and 09.00 the music noise should not be audible within noise-sensitive premises with windows open in a typical manner for ventilation.

Notes to Guidelines 3.2

1. The use of inaudibility as a guideline is not universally accepted as an appropriate method of control. References 6 & 7 (Appendix 1) set out the various issues. This guideline is proposed as there is insufficient evidence available to give more precise guidance.

2. Control can be exercised in this situation by limiting the music noise so that it is just audible outside the noise sensitive premises. When that is achieved it can be assumed that the music noise is not audible inside the noise sensitive premises."

In addition Warrington Borough Council state that they have received representations from a significant number of local residents, businesses and parish councils and further state that they have a duty to their constituents "to provide details of all their concerns". These concerns are stated to be from Walton, Hatton, Town Centre, Stockton Heath as well as general concerns across the Borough. They are articulated but not commented upon by Warrington Borough Council. However, since these representations were made to Warrington Borough Council and not to Halton Borough Council they do not constitute relevant representations.

6.2 INTERESTED PARTIES

6.3 The nature of the application has meant that the definition of who might qualify to be an interested party has had to be addressed. It has been considered appropriate (after consideration of technical advice) to limited

representations to those living or carrying on business within a one and a half mile radius of the application site.

- 6.4 The Residents Committee Against Creamfields 2006 deposited objections from 242 premises (from 465 people) from Daresbury Village, Appleton, Moore Village, Walton Village and Hatton Village.
- 6.5 In addition 25 separate individual representations against the application were received.
- 6.6 Details of representations made by interested parties are set out at [Appendix 4 \(link\)](#). [And additional \(link\)](#).
- 6.7 Most of the representations raise a number of distinct issues. A significant number of these issues are not capable of amounting to relevant representations. This will be a matter for the Committee to determine at the hearing.

7 INVALID REPRESENTATIONS

- 7.1 In addition to the additional representations received by Warrington Borough Council (referred to at 6.1 above) the Council has received 8 individual representations, which have had to be deemed invalid under the relevant legislation. These comprise: 2 from individuals/businesses not in the vicinity (or not identified as being in the vicinity); 1 purporting to be on behalf of 41 unidentified residents; 1 from an individual claiming to be a resident of Hatton Village but providing no address in Hatton Village; 2 with no address; 1 not signed; and 1 received out of time.

8 OPTIONS

- 8.1 The Committee has the following options:

- Grant the application
- Grant subject to conditions
- Reject the application.

- 8.2 The Committee must act with a view to promoting the licensing objectives, namely:

- (a) the prevention of crime and disorder;
- (b) public safety;
- (c) the prevention of public nuisance; and
- (d) the protection of children from harm.

The Committee must also have regard to-

- (a) the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy, and
- (b) the Statutory Guidance issued by the Secretary of State.

9 POLICY IMPLICATIONS

- 9.1 This is a hearing regarding a specific application. Although a number of policies must be taken into account there are no policy implications arising from the application.

10 OTHER IMPLICATIONS

- 10.1 This is the first large open air event to come before the Committee under the 2003 Act. It has attracted a large amount of public attention. Should the application be granted the Committee may wish to request that the Responsible Authorities monitor the event closely and report back to the Committee on all matters touching on the licensing objectives.

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COMMENTS:

The application is well prepared and indicates a professional approach to the concept, planning and organisation of the event. The following points are mainly referred to within the document but the below points should serve to avoid any misunderstandings or ambiguities.

1. In respect of the yellow bands that will be given to members of the public once they have provided satisfactory proof of age, these should be of a type that cannot be removed and transferred to other people. The type used as wrist bands in hospitals would be suitable as they have to be cut to be removed, rather than the 'bangle' type recently in vogue as charity bracelets.
2. All Public Footpaths running across the site must be closed for the duration of the licence, and suitable alternative routes to be identified and displayed.
3. The schedule refers to extensive use of CCTV but no definite reference is made to the need to transfer images if required. Any system that is used must be capable of downloading images onto a hard disk and must be made available to the Police as requested.
4. The schedule indicated that the final 'Safety Sign Off' time will be 1600hrs on Friday, the 25th August 2006. This is a crucial point and previous experience in Merseyside has shown that any delay to this time causes an unacceptable delay throughout the remainder of the timetable. This culminates in a delay in making the site available for occupation at the stated time and causes a serious risk of crushing within the crowds. This time must be adhered to.
5. None of the Security staff employed to come from the Merseyside/Cheshire area. Previous experience has shown that this can compromise staff and lead to breaches in security.
6. The schedule refers to a minimum number of stewards/security staff to be deployed throughout the event, this being 350. This number should not be reduced under any circumstances as this forms an integral part of the Police Contingency and Emergency plans, any variation of this number would obviously compromise these plans.
7. The Schedule makes no reference to any contingency plans for chemical based incidents that may arise from incidents at the two nearby COMAH sites. Though we would not expect this to be written in as any form of

Condition we will be seeking discussions with the organizers, and other relevant bodies, to assess and make any necessary plans to cover this aspect prior to the event opening.

All other steps offered are welcome and acceptable to the Police and will assist in promoting all four objectives of the Act.

Appendix 2

Representations made by Halton Borough Council

Halton Borough Council Environmental Health Building & Enforcement Control Division

Representation in respect of the licensing application for a time limited premises license from James King of Cream for the Creamfields event to be held at Daresbury Estate Daresbury village Halton 26th August 2006- 27 August 2006.

1.0 Introduction

1.1 The division have considered the application in respect of the prevention of public nuisance and public safety.

1.2 Preventing public nuisance can be achieved by creating an environment that controls nuisance with an effective management plan with effective controls during the event so organisers and staff can assess potential risks and work towards minimising possible disturbances.

1.3 Applicants for a license will be expected to demonstrate in their operating schedule that suitable and sufficient measures have been identified and will be implemented and maintained to ensure that the safety of any person visiting or working in licensed premises is not compromised relevant to the individual style and characteristics of the proposed events.

1.4 In consideration of the application and the elements that fall within the remit of the division, the division make representations in two areas namely disturbance from noise and health and safety issues. In both areas the division are recommending that conditions be placed on the license that will mitigate public nuisance and protect public safety.

2.0 Disturbance from noise and potential public nuisance

2.1 In considering the application and the supporting documentation, which was supplied at the time of the application, officers have subsequently met the noise consultant Mr J. Griffiths of Vanguardia Noise Consultants representing the applicant.

2.2 In view of the siting of the event, straddling the boundary with Warrington Borough Council, officers have liaised with their counterparts in Warrington Borough and will continue to liase up to and during the event.

2.3 Noise predictions indicate that before 23:00 hours noise from the event will comply fully with the requirements of the code of practice on Environmental Noise Control at Concerts (CoP). This is not disputed either by Halton Borough Council or Warrington Borough Council. Noise prior to this

time can therefore be conditioned to ensure compliance with the CoP amongst other controls.

2.4 Clause 3.2 of the CoP states that 'for events held between the hours 23:00 and 09:00 music should not be audible within noise sensitive premises with windows open'. It is accepted by all parties that this condition cannot be met. There are 2 footnotes to this condition the first stating that inaudibility is not a 'universally accepted condition' and the second stating that 'control can be exercised in this situation by limiting the music noise so that it is just audible outside the noise sensitive premises.' The assumption that the level is suitable with windows open could seem overly restrictive on the basis of a one-off event.

2.4 A more recent report, 'Noise from Pubs and Clubs (phase II)', was submitted to DEFRA in 2006. This report identified levels at which test subjects felt entertainment noise was just unacceptable with the windows closed, based on a one-off event. The level identified was 34dB LAeq (5 min). Assuming that a closed window offers a minimum of 20dB attenuation. Noise predictions indicate the Creamfields event will comply with this standard at all locations.

2.5 This report also specifies that the majority of subjects reported the ability to tolerate a modest degree of audible entertainment in their home late at night for a one-off occurrence (ie occurring at a frequency of less than every 6 months), and that the onset of audibility did not equate to a threshold of acceptability for intrusive entertainment noise.

2.5 This latest research calls into question the proportionality of requiring that all noise after 23:00 hours should be inaudible in the case of a one-off event, and would suggest that clause 3.2 of the CoP is overly restrictive when conditioning single events.

2.6 Halton Borough Council's Environmental Health Division would therefore consider that controlling the noise from the event to minimise the risk of disturbance on this occasion would be the proportionate approach.

2.7 In conclusion therefore the division will not be objecting in principle to the application on the basis of public nuisance, but will be recommending the following conditions be placed on the licence:

- 1) The Music Noise Level (MNL) shall not exceed 65dB LAeq (15 min) 1 metre from the façade of any noise sensitive premises prior to 23:00 hours.
- 2) After 23:00 hours music noise levels 10m from the mixer desk in each marquee shall not exceed 95dB.
- 3) The main stage shall finish at 23:00 hours.
- 4) Music noise levels from the main stage shall not exceed 98dB LAeq at a position 40 metres from the main speakers.

- 5) The appointed noise consultant shall regularly undertake tests of noise levels at the sound mixer positions to ensure compliance with the licence conditions. A written record of these assessments shall be kept and available to Halton Borough Council's Environmental Health Officer upon request. This shall include any remedial action taken.
- 6) The appointed noise consultant shall carry out one or more noise propagation tests prior to the event. Any such test shall be carried out between 11:00 and 16:00 hours on the day prior to the event and after 10:00 hours on the day of the event. Halton Borough Council's Environmental Health Officers shall be informed of the tests at least one hour prior to commencement.
- 7) The licence holder shall submit a noise management plan to the Environmental Health Division no later than 28 days before the commencement of the event.
- 8) There shall be no construction of the set or any other structure associated with the event outside the hours of 20.00 – 08.00 unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Local Authority.
- 9) If in the opinion of the licensing authority the noise levels become unacceptable notwithstanding compliance with any other noise condition, the applicant shall reduce the noise levels as directed by Environmental Health Officer.

3.0 Health and Safety issues

3.1 In considering the application and the supporting documentation, which was supplied at the time of the application, officers have subsequently consulted with and met the Health and Safety consultant for the event Mr Nigel Haley of MRL Ltd.

3.2 Officer from the Environmental Health Building and Enforcement Control Division of Halton BC will with regards to health and safety be observing their statutory powers in accordance with the Health and Safety at Work Act 1974 and as such require the following points be noted:

3.2.1 Historically under previous licensing legislation the Council would have set and audited the conditions of the licence and thus in effect would have "approved" or otherwise the opening of the event on the grounds of safety. It is not for the Council to approve but they can and will need to agree with all parties that health and safety issues have been addressed and that there are no factors evident at that time which breach appropriate safety legislation to prevent the event taking place. To meet this requirement a representative of Halton Borough Councils Env Health, Bldg & Enforcement Control Division will need to be advised in sufficient time when the main arena is deemed by the applicant to be ready to be opened to the public.

3.2.2 For the same reason the division will need to retain independence from the Event Liaison Team (ELT) and will not sit as a full participating member on the ELT and will only attend in an advisory capacity. They will need to be kept informed by the applicant of all key activities relating to public safety and will when and if deemed necessary liaise with the team on a purely advisory role in order to stay informed on

events and allow them to execute their enforcement duties unless a serious risk is noted in which case they will liaise with the team in an enforcement capacity.

- 3.2.3 As officers of this will not sit on the ELT as a participating member it will be necessary that the applicant ensures that a nominated council representative (the Environmental Health Manager (Health and Safety), the Divisional Manager (Env Health, Building & Enforcement Control) or the Principal EHO (Health and Safety) is kept informed of the progress of the event and notified at the following stages i) Arrival at site ii) The start of the event set up iii) final safety checks prior to opening iv) any other key stages in the executing and operating of the event.
- 3.2.4 The Applicant states in the risk assessment (dated 11th April 06) on page 14 that the audience may take part in other event activities. From discussion with Nigel Haley it is understood that this means the sponsors may set up other activities such as bronco type rides etc. the applicant will need, in sufficient time before the event, to advise the Council of any such activities, which will take place.
- 3.2.5 The applicant states in the supporting documentation that the documents may be amended prior to the event and it is up to individuals to ensure they have up to date copies. Whilst there will be continuous liaison leading up to the event the onus should be on the applicant to advise the Council of any amendments to the risk assessments for the event and any changes generally which relate to public safety.
- 3.2.6 This department, within a sufficient time scale before the event will need to be kept advised of an up to date list of all contractors who will be operating at the event.
- 3.2.7 Such events make use of a variety of special effects involving the use of lasers, strobes, pyrotechnics, bomb tanks, dry ice effects, smoke machines and fireworks, or other similar devices, and the division would need to know in advance what is proposed and how they will be deployed to allow time for consultation and assessment.

3.3 In conclusion the division will not therefore be objecting to the application on the basis of health and safety issues provided that the following conditions are placed on the licence relating to licensing objective Public Safety:

- 1) Upon completion of all preparatory works, and prior to the main arena being opened the Environmental Health Manager (Health and Safety), the Divisional Manager (Env Health, Bldg & Enforcement Control) or the Principal EHO (Health and Safety) of Halton Borough Councils Environmental Health, Building & Enforcement Control Division will be advised by the applicant that they have deemed the arena as being ready to be opened to the public.
- 2) The Environmental Health Manager (Health and Safety), The Divisional Manager (Env Health, Bldg & Enforcement Control) or the Principal

EHO (Health and Safety) of Halton Borough Councils Environmental Health Division will be kept informed by the applicant of the progress of the event and notified at each key stage namely:

- i) Arrival at site
 - ii) The start of the event set up
 - iii) Final safety checks prior to opening
 - iv) Any other key stages in the executing and operating of the event.
- 3) The applicant will furnish the Environmental Health Manager (Health and Safety), The Divisional Manager (Env Health, Bldg & Enforcement Control) or the Principal EHO (Health and Safety) of Halton Borough Councils Environmental Health Division with a list of all contractors who will be operating at the event at the earliest time available but within a minimum of 48 hours prior to the event opening to the public.
 - 4) The applicant will advise the Environmental Health Manager (Health and Safety), The Divisional Manager (Env Health, Bldg & Enforcement Control) or the Principal EHO (Health and Safety) of Halton Borough Councils Environmental Health Division a minimum of 48 hours prior to the event opening to the public of all activities to be carried out by sponsors with particular attention paid to those, which involve public participation.
 - 5) The applicant will ensure the Environmental Health Manager (Health and Safety), The Divisional Manager or the Principal EHO (Health and Safety) of Halton Borough Councils Environmental Health Division always has an up to date copy of the event risk assessment.
 - 6) The applicant will advise the Environmental Health Manager (Health and Safety), The Divisional Manager (Env Health, Bldg & Enforcement Control) or the Principal EHO (Health and Safety) of Halton Borough Councils Environmental Health Division of proposed special effects involving the use of lasers, strobes, pyrotechnics, dry ice effects, smoke machines, and fireworks, or other similar devices and the contractors operating them at least 28 days prior to the performance.
 - 7) The use of lasers should be in accordance with the following conditions:
 - a) The Licensee shall obtain from the laser manufacturer or operator sufficient information, sketches, calculations, radiometric measurement data etc., to demonstrate that the system can be used safely and without risk to health together with the classification of the proposed system.
 - b) All display laser equipment shall be so designed, constructed and maintained as to be safe for use.
 - c) All display laser products shall be provided with a key operated ON-OFF switch to secure the laser against unauthorised use.
 - d) Each effect from a display shall take place within a predetermined and defined display area. The emission of laser radiation shall be terminated automatically immediately the laser effect beam leaves the boundaries of this display area.

- e) The control console for each display laser product shall be secure and sited in such a position that the operator is able to view the whole of the display area. Where this is not practicable, alternative effective arrangements shall be made whereby the operator is able to assess the situation and be aware of any malfunction etc.
- f) All display laser products shall be provided with one or more readily accessible controls which will immediately terminate the emission of any laser radiation. In the event that a laser system is not required to be under the continuous supervision or control of an operator, a person at the display shall be designated to be responsible for the immediate termination of the laser radiation in the event of equipment malfunction audience unruliness or other unsafe conditions.
- g) The accessible emission levels of radiation shall be measured and/or calculated by the operator at all positions where the audience, general public, operators or performers may be exposed to the primary beam (s), or to reflections from targets and scattering materials.
- h) Any area where the levels of laser radiation exceed the accessible emission limit for Class 1 laser products shall be clearly identified, appropriate warning notices posted and barriers erected to prevent the entry of unauthorised persons. Entry into these areas shall be undertaken only by authorised persons if necessary and wearing the appropriate protective equipment.
- i) The level of laser radiation shall not exceed the maximum permissible exposure level at any point where the public is permitted during the display. In addition unless effective means are employed to prevent access to the laser beam(s) the maximum permissible exposure level shall not be exceeded at any point:
 - Less than 3m above any surface upon which the audience/general public is permitted to stand; or
 - Less than 2.5m in lateral separation from any position where a person in the audience/general public is permitted during the display.
- j) The accessible exposure level of laser radiation to operators/performers shall not exceed the maximum permissible exposure if such radiation is intended to be viewed by them in order to perform their functions. In the event that such radiation is not intended to be viewed by them then the accessible exposure level shall not exceed the accessible exposure limit specified for Class 3A laser products.
- k) The use of scanning devices, including mirror balls, shall incorporate a means which shall automatically prevent exposure to levels in excess of those specified in the event of scan failure or other failure.
- l) In the setting up and alignment of laser systems The following precautions shall be taken:-
 - The setting up/alignment of laser systems shall only be undertaken by a trained laser operator. Only those persons

required performing relevant functions shall be present during the alignment/setting up of the system. The accessible emission level of laser radiation shall be reduced to the minimum practicable level and in any event shall not exceed the accessible emission limit for Class 3A laser products. Where necessary for the protection of those employed, appropriate protective equipment shall be worn during the alignment/setting up of the laser equipment.

- A functional check shall be made before the admittance of the public of all safety devices, interlocks etc., which have been provided to ensure the safety of persons prior to each public use of a display laser product.
- Where display laser products are used outdoors, consideration shall be given and adequate safeguards adopted for those persons liable to view the beam directly within the nominal hazard distance and also those who might view the beam or its reflections using optical aids. In this context special consideration shall be given to the hazards that the use of a display laser product might present to traffic movements including those by air, sea, harbour and road.

WARRINGTON BOROUGH COUNCIL'S REPRESENTATION AGAINST THE LICENSING APPLICATION DETAILED BELOW AND A REPORT OF WARRINGTON BOROUGH COUNCIL RESIDENTS CONCERNS

Warrington Borough Council makes representation against the application for a time limited premises license from James King of Cream, 1-3 Parr Street, Liverpool L1 4JJ for the event to be held at Daresbury Estate, Daresbury Village, Halton. Land to the east of Chester Road comprising mainly of fields 6842, 9233 and 9924 from 26th August 2006 – 27th August 2006.

The basis of the Council's representation is submitted to Halton Borough Council on the following grounds:-

PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

That there will be significant disamenity caused by noise from the music to residents living nearby, specifically for residents living within .65 miles of the event in the 200 properties identified in the attached addressed list (Appendix A). It is the view of Warrington Borough Council having received supporting evidence that event organisers cannot comply with the noise council's code of practice on environmental noise control at concerts (Noise Council 1995) after 23.00 hours, in that noise will be audible within residential properties after 23.00 hours. This view is taken based on tests carried out at several key locations near to the proposed event on 19th April 2006 by Warrington Borough Council Environmental Health Officers, details of which are attached in Appendix B.

In addition, Warrington Borough Council has received representations following consultations it has undertaken, during four meetings between 6th April, 4th May 2006 with local residents and business in the Wards that are likely to be affected by the proposed Creamfields event. Approximately 180 residents in total attended. Warrington Borough Council appreciates that some of the responses below are not relevant to the four licensing objectives. However, Warrington Borough Council has a duty to its constituents, to provide details of all their concerns.

APPENDIX B

ENVIRONMENTAL NOISE SURVEY CARRIED OUT IN THE AREA OF THE PROPOSED CREAMFIELDS CONCERT

Prepared by Paul Johnson and Philip Ramsden.

Executive summary.

Using the sound levels provided by Cream and the background noise levels measured on the 27th April 2006 it is predicted that the noise will be audible in nearby residential property after 23.00. This does not comply with The Noise Council's Code of Practice on Environmental Noise at Concerts [Noise Council 1995]

Report

The noise survey was carried out on the night of 19th April 2006 into 20th April 2006, at 8 locations within a 1.5mile radius of the proposed noise source. This survey was carried out in order to provide background noise level measurements at each location. At the time of measurement, the conditions were dry and mild with no wind.

Background noise levels in terms of $L_{Aeq}^{[1]}$ and $LA_{90}^{[2]}$ were recorded at the monitoring sites over 15minute periods; these levels are presented in Table 1. 15 minute measurement time periods were considered long enough to obtain representative values of the equivalent continuous A-Weighted^[3] sound pressure level for the purpose of this assessment.

Measurements were carried out at all locations using a Class 1 precision grade Rion NL-32 Integrating Datalogging Noise Nuisance Recorder (Sound Level Meter), mounted on a tripod 1.2m above the ground and at least more than 3.5m away from any reflecting surface other than the ground. The equipment used included a windshield to minimise interference with the equipment during the monitoring period.

^[1] L_{Aeq} The equivalent continuous A-Weighted sound pressure level over a given time period. Not an average level but an equivalent level.

^[2] LA_{90} A-Weighted sound pressure level of the background noise at the assessment location. L_{90} is the sound level in dB(A) which is exceeded for 90% of the time. It is against this level that the CoP for concerts measures as an L_{Aeq}

^[3] A weighted. An electronic filter built into a sound level meter, which mimics how the human ear responds to sounds at different frequency's under defined conditions.

Results

The results of the noise survey are shown in Table 1.

Table 1 – Measurements in dB(A) taken during the monitoring period. All measurement periods were 15minutes in duration.

It should be noted that an L₉₀ (Background Level) of 30dBA is very quiet, the maximum levels are generated by vehicles passing at speed near to the monitoring positions.

^[4] the background noise level [L₉₀] appears exceptionally low at this location, but it was a measured value.

As a general rule, if the predicted noise levels are 10dB below background levels it should not affect the measured background level. However, it may still be possible to hear the music, especially the base beat which travels further. Non of the predicted levels are 10dB below background noise levels.

How will this affect the residents?

The weather conditions on the day / night of the concert will have a big effect, a wet and windy night will reduce the noise impact by increasing the background noise levels.

A calm dry warm night may result in a greater number of complaints, odd things can happen if there is an inversion but I think this is very unlikely.

Taking each of the monitoring points in order I would expect the effect on residents to be as follows.

1. **Daresbury Churchyard.** Predicted levels are 27.9dB(A). It is likely that outside The Vicarage the music will be audible, inside with windows open for ventilation it is likely to be just audible, but you can still hear the base beat. Windows closed or at the back of the building you should not be able to hear it.
2. **Red Brow Lane.** Predicted levels are 21.1dB(A). It is likely that the considerable distance between Red Brow Lane and the noise source will attenuate any noise from the site sufficiently so as to be just audible outside premises such as The Daresbury Park Hotel. It is however, unlikely that the inhabitants of the hotel will be disturbed by noise from the event.
3. **Driveway opposite Gigg Lane (Moore).** As illustrated in Table 2, the current background noise levels at this location are very low. The predicted noise levels associated with the event are estimated to be 26.3dB(A), which is also a very low figure attributed to the distance between source and receiver. It is likely at this location that noise levels inside properties will not be audible with windows and doors closed, however the noise may be slightly audible in the gardens of the properties.
4. **A56 Roadside (Redmays).** Predicted levels are 35.9dB(A). Due to the short distance between source and receiver, It is likely that outside the houses along this stretch of carriageway the music would be loud enough to recognise the song. Inside the homes with windows closed you may be able to hear the base beat of the music. [See footnote 4. Page 2]

5. **Park Lane.** Predicted levels are 28.8dB(A). As with the Daresbury Churchyard the music will be audible. Inside a property on this lane, with windows open for ventilation it is likely to be just audible, but you can still hear the base beat. Windows closed or at the back of the building you should not be able to hear it.
6. **37 High Warren Close.** Predicted levels are 21.9dB(A). Due to the topography of High Warren Close in relation to the proposed site it is likely that the noise levels at these properties may be perceived to be considerably higher. It is probable that music at this location will be audible at High Warren Close however, indoors with windows open it is likely that only the bass beat will be audible.
7. **Goose Lane.** Predicted levels are 24.8dB(A). It is likely that, again due to the topography of the area noise levels on Goose Lane will be audible. It is also possible that music from the event will also just be audible within the properties in the vicinity of this lane should windows be opened for ventilation.
8. **Footpath opposite Bluecote Farm.** Predicted levels are 29.9dB(A). The topography and the close proximity of this location to the noise source will mean that outside premises in this vicinity the music would be loud enough to recognise the song. Inside the homes with windows closed you may be able to hear the base beat of the music.

Conclusion

A key factor on the night of the event will be the meteorological conditions.

We are satisfied that at a significant number of residential properties near to the Creamfields site the music will be audible within the properties after 23.00.
