SCF6 APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies had been received from Thalia Bell and Cathy Liku.

SCF7 MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on 13 July 2022 were agreed as a correct record.

The Schools Forum thanked Anne Jones for all her support and wished her well for her future retirement.

SCF8 DSG FORECAST OUTTURN - 2022/23

The Forum received a report which advised of the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) forecast outturn for 2022-23 which was £132,136,589, broken down as follows:

Schools Block	£102,178,425
Central Schools Services Block	£728,189
Early Years Block	£9,355,753
High Needs Block	£19,874,222

Representatives were referred to Appendix A to the report, which presented the budget lines for each block in detail and their respective totals.

The report included commentary on each of the four blocks and the forecast outturn for each. It was noted an amount of £49,904,922 was recouped from the Schools Block and an estimated £3,158,000 was recouped from the High Needs Block for academies.

The in year position was a deficit of £1,227,549, plus the deficit balance from 2021-22 of £1,856,222, less the transfer from Schools Block of £763,904, which gave a cumulative deficit of £2,319,867.

The Forum requested to know how Halton's performance was in comparison with neighbouring local authorities. In response the Forum was advised that Halton was performing well when compared against other North West local authorities. In addition it was noted that it was also performing well despite the current level of need which was high, and the deprivation in the Borough.

RESOLVED: That the report is noted.

SCF9 DEDICATED SCHOOLS GRANT (DSG) FUNDING FOR 2023/24

The Forum considered a report from the Strategic Director – Finance, HBC, which presented the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) provisional funding for 2023-24.

It was reported that the provisional DSG settlement was announced on 19 July 2022 and gave Halton a total of £133,191,437 for the Schools Block, Central Schools Services Block (CSSB) and the High Needs Block for 2023-24. The report presented details of the allocations for the above Blocks; the Department for Education has indicated that the Early Years provisional settlement for 2023-24 would be announced in December.

It was noted that the individual budgets to be funded from the CSSB for 2023-24 would be presented at the January meeting of the Forum and the individual High Needs Block budgets would be presented at the February meeting.

Representatives were advised that a consultation on the Schools Block funding formula to be used in Halton for 2023-24 was issued in September 2022. The consultation document was attached to the report at Appendix A and the responses at Appendix B. It was noted that of the 14 schools that responded, all were in agreement with the continuation of following the NFF funding factors and

criteria. The respondents to the consultation were also in agreement with the request for the Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) being set at the January meeting, for the reasons stated.

The Forum agreed with the consultation respondents in supporting the continuation of the National Funding Formula (NFF) methods. They also agreed that a decision on the level of MFG to be applied would be made at the January meeting.

RESOLVED: That Schools Forum

- 1) notes the report;
- 2) supports the continuation of the National Funding Formula methods, principles and rules for mainstream primary and secondary school funding allocations for 2023-24; and
- 3) agrees to make a decision on the level of Minimum Funding Guarantee to be applied to the Schools Block funding formula for 2023-24 at the January 2023 meeting of the Forum.

#### SCF10 FUNDING FOR FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT POSTS

The Forum considered a request from the Operational Director – Finance, which requested approval for a change to the level of funding from the Central Schools Services Block (CSSB) for two posts within the Financial Management Division as they were becoming vacant.

The proposal to advertise for two full time positions was made to Representatives. The current agreement funds one Senior Finance Officer at 0.80 FTE and one full time Finance Officer post. Increasing the Senior Finance Officer post to full time would see an increase of £12,720 when both posts were at the top of their respective grades, based on the current pay rates.

The implications of not funding the Senior Finance Officer post at full time was outlined to Representatives. The Forum agreed that they supported the request and that approval should be given for the additional funding.

RESOLVED: That

- 1) the report is noted; and

SCF11 HALTON BEHAVIOUR SUPPORT SERVICE

The Forum considered a report from the Operation Director – Education, Inclusion and Provision, which gave an overview of the offer and impacts from the Halton Behaviour Support Service (HBSS).

The report outlined the current staffing within the Team and how their work had been impacted throughout the Covid-19 pandemic. It was noted that during the last academic year service visits had returned to pre Covid levels.

Appendix one included details of training and support provided in the HBSS Statement of Impact Evidence Base for 2021-22 for Primary and Secondary Behaviour Teachers; and the Statement of Impact Evidence Base for Family Liaison Officers.

Representatives discussed the Service and concerns were raised around the current service offer, its effectiveness and availability to all schools. It was reported that the Service had been approached for help and its response had led to a school having to obtain support out of the Borough.

It was commented that this could be set as an agenda item for Heads of Primary/Secondary School in Halton meetings, however Officers advised that a decision was needed today, as time would be needed if the current service was to be stopped, to allow for discussions to take place with the Council's HR team.

Following on from the discussion, it was agreed that the Schools Forum would no longer provide funding for a Halton Behaviour Support Service. Officers advised that the Council would be looking at funding for the existing Service until the end of March 2023.

RESOLVED: That

- 1) the report be noted; and
- 2) it was agreed that the Schools Forum would no longer provide funding for a Halton Behaviour Support Service.

SCF12 NOTIONAL SEN BUDGETS

The Forum considered a report from the Divisional Manager 0-25 Inclusion informing on the variance in the ability of the notional Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) budget to meet SEND needs across schools and make recommendations to review.

It was reported that increasingly over the last year, concerns had been raised by schools in relation to their ability to meet the needs of pupils due to the lack of available funding for SEND. The report described in detail how the notional SEND budgets were allocated and how they are intended to be used. Representatives were referred to the table in Appendix one, which showed the impacts of individual schools' notional SEND budgets.

It was reported that due to the increasing expectation of the use of the first £6,000 of support for a pupil coming from the schools mainstream allocation, as per the guidance, it was recommended that Schools Forum undertake a review of the notional SEND budgets, to ensure that it was providing an appropriate level of support for schools with higher levels of SEND. Options to be explored were outlined for the Forum.

RESOLVED: That Schools Forum approves the establishment of a task and finish group of school heads and/or business managers to review how the notional SEND budget is allocated.

### **1.0 PURPOSE OF THE REPORT**

To report to the Schools Forum the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) funding for 2023-24.

### **2.0 RECOMMENDATION: That**

- 2.1 The report is noted.
- 2.2 Schools Forum support the continuation of the National Funding Formula methods, principles and rules for mainstream primary and secondary school funding allocations and de-delegation for 2023-24.
- 2.3 Schools Forum agree to make a decision on the level of Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) to be applied to the Schools Block funding formula for 2023-24.
- 2.4 Schools Forum agree the preferred option from paragraph 3.5 (a) (b) or (c) on the allocation of the surplus DSG for 2023-24.

### **3.0 SUPPORTING INFORMATION**

#### **3.1 Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) settlement**

The 2023-24 DSG settlement was announced on 16<sup>th</sup> December 2022 allocating Halton a total of £143.393m, which is broken down as £106.745m for the Schools Block, £0.738m for the Central Schools Services Block, £26.135m for the High Needs Block, and £9.775m for the Early Years Block.

In addition Halton has received £4.796m as part of the recent £2b commitment for Education from the Autumn 2022 budget announcements. The amount relating to Mainstream schools and academies, which will be provided in addition to the formula funding determinations for schools, is £3.741m. The balance of £1.055m is provided to support the High Needs block.

#### **3.2 Schools Block**

The Schools Block provisional allocation is £106.745m, based on the October 2022 census data which is an increase of £4.567m compared to the actual Schools Block allocation for 2022-23. Including the additional grant for schools of £3.741m results in £110.487m to be allocated to Mainstream schools and academies for 2023-24, this represents an overall increase of £5.223m or 4.96% when compared to 2022-23

The DfE have uplifted the cash values of most factors within the National Funding Formula so our Primary Unit of Funding (PUF) is increasing by 5.15% from £4,959.88 to £5,215.18 for 2023-24 and the Secondary Unit of Funding (SUF) is increasing from £6,251.11 by 6.35% to £6,648.26 for 2023-24.



These PUFs and SUFs for 2023-24 are to be multiplied by the number of primary and secondary age pupils in the October 2022 census to give our final Schools Block allocation

Please note that the PUFs and SUFs are used solely to calculate the amount of overall Schools Block funding due to the LA and do not represent any individual school budget formula factor units.

The DfE have uplifted by 2.4% the NFF cash values for Basic Entitlement, FSM, LPA, EAL, Mobility, Sparsity and the Lump Sum. The FSM6 and IDACI cash values have been uplifted by 4.3%. The Funding Floor and MPPL factors have been uplifted by 0.5% in line with MFG. No uplift has been applied to premises factors, except for PFI which has increased by RPIX 11.2%.

For information Schools' Forum should note that the Supplementary Grant which was paid as a separate grant in 2022-23 has been rolled into the NFF for 2023-24 as follows: Basic per pupil (primary) £97, Basic per pupil (KS3) £137, Basic per pupil (KS4) £155, FSM6 (primary) £85, FSM6 (secondary) £124 and Lump sum £3,680. A new 'Additional Grant' has been developed for 2023-24, *see 3.6 for more details*.

Both Primary and Secondary sectors have seen an overall net decrease in pupil numbers counted at the October 2022 census when compared to the previous funding census of October 2021. This has resulted in Halton receiving £1.021m less DSG than the previous indicative allocations provided in July 2022 included. Schools should have planned for their anticipated reductions in pupil numbers in order to sustain a balanced budget position for 2023-24.

For 2023-24 we are required to use all the NFF funding factors which requires the introduction of the **Pupil Mobility** factor and **Sparsity** factors in Halton. The latest dataset provided in December 2022 for use in the 2023-24 school budget determinations in compliance with NFF operational guidance, confirms that 16 Primary and 1 Secondary schools are eligible for Mobility and 0 schools are eligible for Sparsity funding. The total cost of the Mobility factor is £0.076m which is funded through available Schools' Block funding.

We are also required to be within +/- 2.5% of the NFF cash values which is not an issue as Halton has been using the NFF cash values since they were introduced from 2018-19, albeit with a few minor variations in some previous years prior to 2023-24 to ensure we fully devolve the Schools Block allocation.

### **3.3 Minimum Funding Guarantee**

The MFG continues in 2023-24 but with a lower permissible range of 0.0% to plus 0.5%, meaning that a school's per pupil amount must increase by a minimum of up to 0.5% when compared to the previous year.

Following the release of the 2023-24 school funding dataset and DSG allocations in December 2022, and after applying all NFF factors to schools budget determinations, based on the LA priority to ensure all schools per-pupil funding is protected to the maximum permissible level, being 0.5% for MFG, there are 8 schools that require the MFG protection for 2023-24. The total cost of the MFG is £0.100m which is funded through available Schools' Block funding.

**The LA therefore propose that Schools' Forum apply the maximum MFG protection of 0.5% to the 2023-24 funding formula.**

**3.4 Schools Block Funding Formula**

It is proposed to continue to follow the National Funding Formula, using the NFF cash values for all factors. These are provided at **Appendix A** for information.

**3.5 Headroom – Surplus DSG**

Following the development of the 2023-24 school budget determinations in accordance with all proposals above, using the unit values as per Appendix A, and in 100% compliance to the NFF statutory requirements, there is a surplus balance of Schools Block DSG. The surplus of £0.200m is essentially due to un-allocated Growth funding that has been included within the Schools Block allocation.

Schools' Forum consideration and recommendation is required as to how best to allocate this funding for 2023-24. The options available are:

**a. Growth Funding**

Retain the £0.200m balance in a Growth Funding reserve to be used to financially support any in-year planned growth to schools pupil numbers.

LA observation:

In accordance with school funding operational guidance this would have to meet Basic Need and minimum class size criteria in order to be able to allocate to any eligible schools. Given the current demographic trends and reductions in pupil numbers, which are set to continue over several years, there may be some issues in allocating this funding in-year to any schools.

Additionally, once the schools funding formula is set for 2023-24 there can be no in-year redeterminations therefore any unallocated Growth funding cannot be redistributed to school or academies. Any balance un-allocated Growth funding at the financial year would therefore be used to offset the overall end of year DSG position, in effect contributing to offsetting any deficits in the other DSG blocks.

**b. Transfer to High Needs Block**

Transfer the £0.200m from the Schools Block to High Needs Block.

LA observation:

A transfer to High Needs of £0.243m represents 0.19% of the 2023-24 Schools Block and well within the permissible 0.50% transfer that can be approved by Schools' Forum without any DfE disapplication being required.

The pressures on High Needs are ongoing and increasing due to greater volumes of in-borough Special school and Resourced Provision places, higher numbers of high-cost out-of-borough specialist placements being required, and increasing numbers of pupils with Education Health and Care Plans (EHCPs) receiving top-up funding in Mainstream schools and academies.

Halton is subject to external intervention as part of the DfE's 'Delivering Better Value (DBV)' in High Needs programme in respect to the recovery of the accumulating deficit on the High Needs block.

Any transfer to High Needs would benefit all SEND pupils within the region by being invested to support developments of in-borough capacity and sufficiency for local SEND provision.

**c. Allocate to Schools formula funding**

Increase the Basic Entitlement factor by £12.37 per pupil to distribute the £0.200m to all Mainstream schools and academies.

LA Observation:

Whilst the current formula modelling and indicative budgets shown at Appendix B are based on 100% compliance with the published NFF values for 2023/24, all LAs are permitted to revise the values used for 2023-24 actual schools budgets to within +/- 2.5% of the NFF values. Adding £12.37 per pupil to Basic Entitlement does not breach this threshold.

Not all schools will see the full financial benefit of the additional £12.37 per pupil where they are currently protected through the Minimum Per Pupil Funding Level (MPPFL) or the Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG). There are currently 2 schools in receipt of MPPFL and 8 schools in receipt of MFG. All 10 schools would see their protection funding reduce when Basic Entitlement increases with 1 of the MFG schools seeing their increase being sufficient to remove them from MFG completely.

**Schools' Forum are asked to consider the options a. to c. above and recommend their preferred option to allocate the surplus DSG for 2023-24.**

**3.6 Mainstream Schools Additional Grant (MSAG)**

The 2022 Autumn Statement announced that the core schools budget will increase by £2 billion in the 2023 to 2024 financial year, over and above totals announced at the Spending Review 2021.

In the 2023 to 2024 financial year, mainstream schools will be allocated additional funding through the mainstream schools additional grant (MSAG) 2023 to 2024. This is in addition to schools' allocations through the schools national funding formula.

The indicative additional grant allocation for Halton's Mainstream schools and academies is £3.741m. The DfE will publish confirmed individual school-level allocations in Spring 2023.

Indicative School Funding allocations including MSAG are at **Appendix B** for information.

**3.7 Central Schools Services Block**

The CSSB allocation is £0.719m based on pupil numbers on the October 2022 census plus £0.019m for the Historical funding giving a total of £0.738m which represents an overall increase of £0.010m when compared to 2022-23. The Historic commitment funding has again reduced by 20% and as this is used to fund the Safeguarding post, the balance required to be met by schools & academies will also increase, as previously agreed.

The CSSB is also responsible for meeting the mandatory top-slice charge for Copyright Licences which cover all schools and academies in Halton. The charge excluding VAT for 2023-24 is £122,114 which is an 11.8% increase when compared to 2022-23. This increase has been challenged back to the DfE as it does not appear to be in keeping with their Value for Money and economies of scale principles.

The support service budgets included in CSSB are supported by annual contributions from the De-Delegation and Education Functions factors applicable to Maintained Schools. Academies contributions are received via direct charges where applicable.

Schools' Forum are required to approve the De-Delegation and Education Functions unit values each year. For 2023-24 the values proposed have been uplifted only in relation to help contribute to pay award increases.

The 2023-24 unit values for Forum approval are as follows:

### 3.8 **High Needs Block**

The High Needs Block allocation has been announced as £25.080m before Academy and Further Education (FE) recoupment, but including the reduction in respect to net exports of SEND children being educated in other areas. We estimate the Academy and FE recoupment will be £3.134m for the per place funding element for 2023-24 which leaves £21.946 available to Halton for distribution.

Following Autumn budget statement announcements Halton has been provided with £1.055m of additional DSG funding to supplement the High Needs block, the total available to Halton therefore being £23.001m for 2023-24.

**The individual High Needs Block budgets will be presented at the February meeting.**

### 3.9 **Early Years Block**

The DSG announcement has provided an indicative Early Years allocation which includes the up to date hourly rates to be used in Halton's determination of the 2, 3 and 4 year old early education funding entitlement to Maintained Nursery Schools, Nursery Classes, and Private Voluntary and Independent (PVI) settings.

The 2023-24 allocation remains indicative until after the January 2023 early years headcount has been collated, validated and used by the DfE to inform Halton's actual Early Years Block allocation to be notified in July 2023.

The indicative allocation for 2023-24 is £9.775m which is £0.498m greater than 2022-23 but this increase is likely to decrease in line with the current demographic trends.

Schools' Forum are required to approve the hourly rates and supplements to be applied to the 2023-24 funding allocations for all providers. These will be confirmed following the validation and release of the January 2023 Headcount data

**The Early Years hourly rates and supplements will be presented for recommendation at the February 2023 meeting.**

## 4.0 **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

4.1 We are required to set a local funding formula in line with the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) technical and operational guidance for 2023-24. Failure to do so will result in the DfE imposing a funding formula on us.

4.2 The proposals included within this paper are all funded from within the available Dedicated Schools Grant block allocations provided for 2023-24.
